1. Please use English to introduce yourself, explain why you want to pursue graduate study in history, describe your research interest, and state your career plan. (25%)

2. Please translate the following into Chinese, and provide a brief comment of yours: (50%)

As Susan Rubin Suleiman argues, "[I]f there is a 'duty to remember', there is also, just as importantly, a 'duty to forget'". Forgetting can and should be seen as the "active agent" in the formation of memories, as it "gives memories their shape and relief". Marc Augé has made similar argument with a rather poetic analogy: "Memories are shaped by forgetting, like the contours of the shore by the sea". From this perspective, what we know and remember about the past depends on what we forget. Furthermore, as more and more scholars have recognized identities such as nation as a "form of narrative", writing history—and thereby the symbiotic relationship between remembering and forgetting—can and should also be seen as crucial to identity formation. In his classic analysis of the formation of nation, Ernest Renan argued that the "possession in common of a rich legacy of memories" is one of the two pillars that constitute a nation. Yet he specifically pointed out, in pursuit and maintenance of national unity, nationalistic account of history often forgets the "deeds of violence which took place at the origin of all political formations". Renan concluded, forgetting is a "crucial factor in the creation of a nation". Thereby, in order to delineate our past and/or to define who we are, remembering and forgetting are equally important.

3. This is a brief guideline to gaining access to a historical archive; please translate it into Chinese: (25%)

You will need a reader's card to access the original document reading rooms. To apply for or renew a reader's card you will need to register online. Registering online takes less than fifteen minutes. You can do it: 1) within six weeks of your intended visit, using a computer; or 2) on the day of your visit, using one of the computers in our reader registration area. You will have your photograph taken in the reader registration room for your reader's card when you visit. The photograph will show your full head without any head or face covering unless worn for religious or medical reasons. In order to obtain or renew your reader's card you must have two separate forms of identification with you: one to prove your name, the other to prove your address. You cannot use the same document for both proof of identity and address.
