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# **III.** Summary: DO NOT list points. Your summary should read like a coherent <u>paragraph</u> and its length should be about <u>1/4</u> of the passage. (20%)

Communities of practice, according to Wenger & Snyder (2000), are informal groups of people bound together through a shared passion for a joint enterprise. Wenger (1998) explains that the conceptual framework in which community of practice is a constitutive component, is that of a social theory of learning. A social theory of learning is based on a number of premises, including: the fact that as social beings, we learn through social interaction; the idea that knowledge can be equated to competence in a valued enterprise, and is realised through active engagement in that enterprise; and the understanding that learning occurs through our social experiences which ultimately leads to meaning (Wenger, 1998). A social theory of learning, then, is connected with learning and knowing within social participatory experiences. Wenger (1998) goes further to propose a model to represent a social theory of learning which is comprised of four constituents: community, meaning, practice and identity. In explaining the constituents of this model, Wenger (1998) summarises the significant terms as:

- -Meaning: a way of talking about our (changing) ability individually and collectively to experience our life and the world as meaningful.
- -Practice: a way of talking about the shared historical and social resources, frameworks, and perspectives that can sustain mutual engagement in action.
- -Community: a way of talking about the social configurations in which our enterprises are defined as worth pursuing and our participation is recognizable as competence.
- -Identity: a way of talking about how learning changes who we are and creates personal histories of becoming in the context of our communities. (Wenger, 1998, p. 5)

Although the notion of communities of practice has traditionally been associated with adult and workplace learning (Wenger & Snyder, 2000; Falk, forthcoming), and also with business and employees (Wenger & Snyder, 2000; Mitchell, 2000; Young, 2000), there has been a crossover of interest into virtual communities, albeit with a focus on e-commerce (Lipnack & Stamps, 1997; Tapscott, 1999; Turban et al, 2000).

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Also, the four aspects of the model of a social theory of learning and Wenger's definitions seem to lend themselves to a wider consideration of community and the types of learning that occur within communities that have no business or commercial enterprise at stake. Wenger & Snyder (2000), for example, remark, 'people in Communities of Practice share their experiences and knowledge in free-flowing, creative ways that foster new approaches to problems' (p. 7).

Translation is everywhere—at the United Nations, the European Union, the World Trade Organization, and many other international bodies that regulate fundamental aspects of modern life. Translation is part and parcel of modern business, and there's hardly a major industry that doesn't use and produce translations for its own operations. We find translations on the bookshelves of our homes, on the reading lists for every course in every discipline taught at college; we find them on processed-food labels and on flat-pack furniture instructions. How could you do without translation? It seems pointless to wonder what world we would live in if translation didn't happen all the time at every level, from bilingual messages on ATM screens to confidential discussions between heads of state, from the guarantee slip on a new watch we've just bought to the classics of world literature.

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and decline to learn the other languages we need, we could simply ignore people who don't speak the way we do. These three options seem fairly radical, and it's likely that none of them figures among the aspirations of the readers of this article.
