- 3. W. E. B. Du Bois once said, "The problem of the twentieth century is the problem of the color line." Do you agree with this statement?

 Comment on this statement by referring to at least three writers in American literature.
- 4. One of the thematic concerns in American literature is pivoted on the issue of migration, from the early immigrant journey from Europe, the westward movement, sense of belonging or sense of homelessness, reluctant or voluntary immigration from Africa and Asia, to transnational migration in the current era. Refer to at least three literary works to discuss Americans' experiences of migration and settlement.
