How solar power is lighting up a continent

The renewable energy industry in Africa is seeing huge growth. Until recently the majority of homes as well as many hospitals and schools in Africa did not have access to electricity, but things are now beginning to change.

The problem has forced many African entrepreneurs, as well as large companies, to think outside the box and come up with innovative projects. These range from things like solar lanterns and radios to larger projects such as mobile kiosks providing solar charging facilities.

Despite the lack of easily accessible energy, it is not unusual to see people in rural communities with mobile phones and other hi-tech gadgets that need charging. The mobile kiosk solves that problem. Another area of development is solar panels and storage units, which can be installed in individual homes. Now these gadgets can be charged regularly and families can use lighting when it is dark.

Another successful innovation is pay-as-you-go renewable energy for villages which are far away from the national electricity grid. Currently these households often use kerosene (a fuel oil) for lighting and open fires for cooking, both of which can be inefficient and dangerous. For example, families using kerosene lamps often suffer from sore eyes and headaches because of the fumes from the burning oil.

Firewood has been used as a fuel in Africa for thousands of years and has contributed greatly to the loss of forests across the continent, causing huge environmental problems such as poor soil.

Another interesting idea that one entrepreneur has developed is an office table which includes a power bank, (a kind of battery) for mobile devices. It means that students or business people can use their tablets or laptops for twenty-four hours without the need to recharge them. Other ideas from around the world include solar-powered systems to change seawater into drinking water and solar water irrigation systems for farmers to water their crops. So, as cooking fires and kerosene lamps disappear, Africa is lighting up more brightly and, at the same time, benefiting from healthier living conditions.

Out of road: driverless vehicles are replacing the trucker

Ramona Saucedo has been on the road for nearly two months, and she's ready to get back home. Standing in front of her truck in the parking lot of a truck stop, she's waiting for a call from her business partner, who is checking on her progress. If she stays on schedule, driving 10 or 11 hours a day, she'll be back home next week.

At 52, Saucedo has been driving long-haul for nearly a decade. It's a job that runs in the family: her father and brother were both truck drivers, and Saucedo says she started driving mainly for the pay. At her old job as an office worker, she had to scrape and scrounge if one of her two children needed some money. Now, she drives thousands of miles a week all over the country, sleeping inside the truck. Money is no longer a problem.

At the truck stop, Saucedo is surrounded by hundreds of drivers in a similar situation. The United States has more than three million truck drivers, many of whom drive long-haul, or 'over the road' as it's known in the business. It's one of the highest paying jobs available that does not require a college degree, but its future is increasingly uncertain.

As the sun sets, the parking lot starts filling up with drivers stopping for the night. Sleeping in the truck is part of the job. 'I call this my "tiny house",' grins Patrick Spicer, 67, a long-haul driver from Reno, as he shows off the inside of his new 2017 Kenworth T680. There are bunk beds, a cupboard for clothes and a refrigerator for food.

Spicer has been driving for 20 years. 'If you are smart and don't waste your money, you can make a good living,' he says. But he's not optimistic about what's ahead. 'There is no future in trucking,' he says. 'In 10 or 15 years, these vehicles will all be self-driving trucks. There is no way to stop it.'

In San Francisco, Stefan Seltz-Axmacher, 27, is one of the people trying to take the humans out of the truck. Sitting in the driver's seat of a truck he has modified, he leans forward and adjusts a pair of robotic feet that rest over the brake and accelerator pedals. Underneath the steering wheel is a small motor that can steer the vehicle. These devices, along with radar and cameras fixed on the exterior, allow the truck to be driven remotely by a human in congested city areas. Once it is on the open highway, the truck can drive itself.

Seltz-Axmacher is the co-founder of Starsky Robotics, a small start-up working on self-driving trucks. The U.S. trucking industry moves more than 10 billion tons of freight a year so his market is already made. 'We would lease the robots to the trucking companies,' he explains. 'We are able to go to people who are already looking for drivers, and be their driver.'
